



## KYLE WHITTINGHAM - HEAD COACH

- Entering his 15th season as Utah's head coach, Whittingham is the longest-tenured head coach in the Pac-12 and has contributed to more victories (205) than any coach in program history.
- Led Utah to a 9-5 season (6-3 Pac-12) including its 30-7 win over the Buffs (Nov. 30, 2019) to win the Pac-12 South and advance to the Pac-12 Championship.
- Joined the Utes in 1994 as the defensive coordinator and has won 205 games in his 24 years on the staff, including a 120-61 record as the head coach from 2005-2018.
- Coached the Utes to 14 wins over AP top 25 ranked teams, including victories over No. 4 Alabama (2009), No. 5 Stanford (2013) and No. 8 UCLA (2014).
- Named National Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association in 2008 after an undefeated 13-0 season and win over Alabama in the Sugar Bowl, placing them at No. 2 in AP's rankings.
- Three-time semifinalist for the George Munger Coach of the Year Award from 2014-16.
- Whittingham played linebacker for BYU from 1978-1981 and was named WAC Defensive Player of the Year in 1981.
- Raised in Provo, Utah, Whittingham is now married with four children, two of whom played football for the Utes.



## ZACK MOSS - SENIOR RB

- Enters 2019 on the Maxwell Award Watch List.
- Named 2018 All-Pac-12 Second Team.
- Played and started in nine games this season before his season was cut short due to injury.
- Had 179 carries for 1,096 yards, the sixth most in the Pac-12 and averaged 121.77 yards per game, the sixth-most in a single season in program history.
- Rushed for 11 touchdowns this season, the sixth-most in the conference.
- Had career-high 211 rushing yards, three touchdowns, and two receptions for 14 yards against UCLA (Nov. 16, 2018).
- Moss is majoring in communication and plans to obtain his degree in December 2019.
- His parents are Anthony and Cassandra Moss and cousins are Santana and Sinorice Moss. Santana was an All-American at Miami who tallied more than 10,000 yards receiving during a 14-year NFL career, while Sinorice was a second-round draft pick out of Miami who spent six years in the NFL.



## BRADLEE ANAE - SENIOR DE

- Named to 2019 Bednarik Award Watch List.
- Started in all 14 games last season, with the final 11 starts at right end.
- Led the Pac-12 in sacks with 8.0, earning 2018 First-Team All-Pac-12 honors.
- Recorded 15.5 tackles for loss, good for third in the Conference and second on the Utes' defense.
- Had the most tackles on the Utes' defensive line (51), including a season-high seven tackles with 1.5 TFL (1.0 sack) against BYU (Aug. 29th, 2018).
- As a sophomore in 2017, he led the Utes with 7.0 sacks (seventh in Pac-12) and tied for the team lead in tackles for loss (10.0)
- Recorded single-game highs in tackles (eight) and sacks (2.5) in the Utes' win against Colorado (Nov. 25, 2017).
- Anae's father played football at BYU from 1979-1981 and was a two-time All-American (honorable mention in 1980 and third team in 1981) before being drafted by the USFL's Houston Gamblers. His sister, Adora, was a first-team All-American and three-time All-Pac-12 Volleyball Player for the Utes. His sister, Pati, played volleyball at Portland state, while his uncle, Robert Anae, is the offensive coordinator and inside receivers coach at Virginia.
