DID YOU KNOW?

- --2015-16 marks the 20th anniversary of the NCAA/Pac-12 Champion Sun Devils led by ASU Hall of Famer Randy Lein.
- -- Jon Rahm of Barrika Spain and Max Rottluff of Dusseldorf Germany competed for team Europe in the 2015 Palmer Cup.
- -- Alberto Sanchez as a 17-year old qualified for the 2012 U.S. Open, turning 18 on the day of the final round. He shot a 2-over par and was tied for 23rd after the first round of the U.S. Open, but missed the cut after the second round.
- -- A transfer from the University of Idaho, Jared du Toit spent two seasons with the Vandals, notably leading the team in scoring (69.61) and posting three victories, including a first-place finish at the Big Sky Conference Championship in 2014-15. The junior is also the reigning champion of the British Columbia Amateur.

-- The team aided in the rendering of the 12th annual Healing Field flag display, hosted at Tempe Beach Park in the fall. The event provides a solemn tribute to the Victims of the September 11th attacks, as 3,000 flags are displayed in memoriam of those inflicted.



≛ TOP PERFORMERS

- --Jon Rahm is currently ranked World Amateur No. 1 by the World Amateur Golf Rankings (WAGR). Max Rottluff (No. 23) and Jared du Toit (No. 84) are ranked within the top-100.
- --Rahm earned his ninth-career victory at the ASU Thunderbird Invitational to pass Billy Mayfair for the second most wins in program history. Rahm stands as the only three-time winner in the event's 34-year history.
- --Rahm is the reigning recipient of the prestigious Ben Hogan Award, honoring the top player in collegiate golf. He was also awarded the McCormack medal as the top world amateur in 2015.
- --Entering this year Sun Devil Athletics has had 70 Academic All-Americans since 2000, secondmost in the Pac-12 in that time and seventh in the NCAA.

- --Tim Mickelson was a member of Arizona State's 1996 NCAA Championship team and earned runner-up honors at the 1999 Pac-12 Championships while playing for Oregon State.

Senior Brandon McIver earned his second straight Pac-12 all-academic honorable mention nod last season with 3.19 cumulative GPA, majoring in sociology. As a team, the Ducks have been just as sharp in the classroom as on the golf course, with five golfers with GPA's above 3.0.

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ACADEMIC SPOTLIGHT

Maverick McNealy tends to favor an analytical approach when it comes to breaking down his game, which is no surprise, because he is studying industrial engineering that is modified to add computer science and statistics. His concentration is in financial and decision engineering -- or, basically, how to take a massive amount of data and make the best possible decision from that information.

He has developed a model to calculate strokes gained-putting and his proximity to the hole relative to PGA Tour standards. He figured he was losing about three shots per round on the greens. Part of the reason? He never knew how to practice -- this was the first time in his life that he'd had a golf club, not a hockey stick, in his hand every day of the year. "There's no rebuild phase trying to get my touch back," he says.

Just as he sought out Cameron Wilson for his stinger driver shot and David Boote for his bunker play, McNealy also worked with the best putters on the team and tried to learn from them. During his sophomore season, he was about three shots better on the greens, per round, which made him eight or nine shots better over the course of a 54-hole tournament. That's the difference between finishing, say, 25th and first.

But his strokes gained model is nothing compared to his tournament logs. For every event -- every round, every qualifier -- he writes up four pages of notes. A general assessment of how he played. Every shot he hit. What he felt. What he thought.

"It's a stockpile of information," he says of his notes, "all right there at my disposal."

"It's not just a record. It's a form of therapy.

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ACADEMIC SPOTLIGHT

Senior Andrew Levitt is eyeing a career in real estate one day. It's something he gained an appreciation for while sharpening his academic skills during a semester away from USC's golf team. But Levitt has been refining his ball striking skills as well and is in the midst of the best season in his collegiate career, so it's no surprise that he'd just as soon continue with his golf career as long as he can. Levitt has started every tournament during his final season, his nine events played more than his combined total of the past three seasons. He has three top 5 finishes, including his first collegiate win at the Southwestern Jones Invitational. It's a satisfying rebound for Levitt, whose swing change late in his prep career (he calls it "just the wrong decision") derailed the start of his college career. Levitt, the former prep star, saw limited action as a freshman and, as a sophomore, spent the spring semester in 2014 away from the team. He also broke his wrist during that respite, further distancing himself from the game. He found, however, the time away from golf not only refocused his academics but re-ignited his game as well. Head Coach Chris Zambri brought him back onto the squad for the 2014-15 season as a reserve and Levitt then grabbed a starting spot on this year's squad, one that has been ranked No. 1 for much of the spring. He is majoring in in the real estate track of policy, planning and development and has an internship lined up this summer. But as he nears the finish of his college career, he plans to take a shot at playing professionally as well. Said Levitt: "It is really rewarding to finally be playing and starting. The level of where my game is at, I kind of expect that. It made it a lot easier to come back as I had seen myself doing it before. It made it easier to find my groove again. I came back to have a shot at making this a career. It's awesome, and the people on the team have really made me better. You're playing with guys who shoot low and you have to rise to their level. It's been a key to me getting back."



COMMUNITY CORNER

The entire Trojan men's golf team joined more than 125 USC student-athletes at the 5th annual Trojan "Community Bowl" - this year featuring a day spent at 186th Street Elementary in Gardena, Calif., to meet local schoolchildren and help spruce up their school. The Trojan student-athletes spent an entire Saturday, completing a sum of 30 tasks with the school's students, which included painting murals, digging and planting gardens and re-tooling the school's athletic facilities. Senior Tyler Salsbury, an Academic All-Pac-12 selection last year was on the Dean's List again this winter and carries a 3.69 GPA while majoring in Business Administration with a concentration in marketing. His admittance into one of the most competitive and highly regarded schools at UW is a testament to his hard work.

Senior Chris Babcock joined Salsbury on the most recent Dean's List, finishing the winter quarter with a 3.60 GPA while majoring in Communication.

During Matt Thurmond's tenure as head coach, four Washington players have earned Scholar All-America honors.
